SGO members, students removed from India discussion and vote

Move may have broken law, official says

Council members and some students in the audience were told to leave during a discussion and vote at a recent Student Government Organization (SGO) meeting, a move that may have violated New Jersey State law.

"I just don't understand why they would do that," said Adam Goldstein, attorney advocate for the Student Press Law Center, when informed about the SGO action.

"This vote pertains to the people that went to India...So if you attended the India trip you have to step out of the meeting because you're not allowed to participate in the discussion or the vote," said Aurora Estevez, SGO VP of Finance and Administration, during the council session. "That also pertains to people that have went to India and are part of the audience."

Six council members that attended the trip left the February 28th meeting and were not allowed to take part in the vote that would have reimbursed \$7,500

to students that have attended the India study abroad trip last January.

The motion failed as only 6 council members supported it and 12 voted against it.

Dean of Students, Lyn Hamlin and SGO advisor James Robilotta discussed and agreed with the SGO Executive Board to

clear the room of students who had gone on the trip because of a "conflict of interest."

"If they (the student government) are subject to the open meetings law – and I believe they are – there's no question there was a violation of the law. Asking people to leave a meeting because of a conflict of interest is

asinine behavior. As a member of the public, you are allowed to have an interest," said Goldstein.

Goldstein cited New Jersey state law and said, "Any member of the public has a right to be present at all meetings of public bodies. Public bodies are bodies to which governmental functions are delegated. Are the students

performing a function delegated to them by a higher governmental funding authority? If so, they are a public body and subject to the law."

"We weren't trying to break the law," said Hamlin.

According to Hamlin, it didn't seem fair for council members that attended the trip to vote because of a conflict of interest.

"It sounded logical to us that people who got the money not be part of the vote," said Hamlin.

"I was not aware of the law," said Robilotta.

"Admin[istration] strongly recommended to have them leave," said Robilotta.

"There was no sinister motive," said John Melendez, VP for Student Affairs, who said he advised council members that voting on their own compensation would represent a conflict of interest. He said he advised council members who attended the trip to recuse themselves from the discussion and debate about compensation.

"There was a discussion, there were mixed opinions overall. When we discussed it they [the executive board] were okay with

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NJCU campus undergoes \$30 million renovation

NJCU continues construction across the campus. The Capital Renewal Program, one of the largest and most comprehensive construction projects—an estimated \$30 million—the University has ever embarked upon.

"[The project] is going to provide a higher comfort level to all students," said Andrew Christ, the Associate Vice President for Facilities and Construction Management and Co-Chair of Campus Infrastructure Working Group (CIWG). "[I]ncluding a lot of invisible things...such as HVAC (Heating, Ventilation, and Air Conditioning), electrical and water infrastructure."

Based upon a 2009 facilities condition assessment, a prioritized list of reconstruction around the entire campus was created. In 2010, Aaron Aska, Vice President for Administration and Finance, and Co-Chair of CIWG, secured bonds for \$30 million to fund the newly created Capital Renewal Program.

Chris Rice, 23, film major from

Oldbridge said, "I think any money invested into the school is a good thing. Keeping students' benefits in mind should always be considered." He said, "Parking is an issue and more money should be invested to address the problem."

The project has been split into two separate phases encompassing almost the entire campus from Hepburn Hall and Guarini Library to John J. Moore Athletics and Fitness Center (JMAC) and

University Academy Charter School.

Phase I of the project includes: Fries Hall, Professional Studies Building, Rossey Hall, Science Building, Visual Arts Building and Vodra Hall.

Phase II encompasses: Co-op Dormitory, Gilligan Student Union Building (GSUB), Guarini Library, Hepburn Hall, John Moore Athletic Center, University Academy Charter School, Vodra

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the decision.”

“From my understanding, it was the general feel of the executive board that it would be a conflict of interest to have the participants in the room and a more open and honest discussion would be had if they were not in the room,” said Robert Quinones, Coordinator of Community Services and Greek Life.

SGO council meetings are structured by the Robert's rules of order -- a guide book on how deliberations at an assembly should proceed.

Dr. Fran Moran, political science professor, observed the meeting and said, “Asking the people who would be impacted by this to leave is against the Robert's rules of order.”

“I thought it was fair because I thought it was part of Robert's rules,” said Estevez.

“I think it was skewed...that everyone who spoke against it stayed,” said Michael Faivush, President of SGO.

Faivush left the meeting because he attended the India trip.

Asked if he felt forced to leave, Faivush said, “Was I technically forced? No. But we were strongly influenced on a method of conducting the vote which we later found out was not valid.”

Giselle Ojagir, SGO Executive Vice President, also left the meeting.

Goldstein said violations of the Open Meetings Act can result in fines against the offending body. He said such cases are unusual, but they do happen. He cited a case at Montclair State University, a couple of years ago, where their SGO settled a case out of court. As part of the settlement, the SGO agreed to abide by the Open Meetings Act.

According to Ojagir, she didn't know asking students to leave the meeting was against the law and that it wasn't part of the Robert's rules of order.

“When we vote for a new club we ask them to leave that vote so they won't know who voted for

or against,” said Ojagir, who thought the same procedure applied to the reimbursement vote.

“It seemed that we had to leave so we did. I never asked to stay. We were told to do so, so I didn't resist,” said Jennifer Vazquez, 21, BFA painting and drawing major from Jersey City. Vazquez is a voting member of the council.

Ask how she would have voted

if she stayed, Vezquez said “I would have voted against the reimbursement because I decided to go on the trip knowing I wasn't going to get the \$500 back. I didn't want to seem greedy. I think it looks good as a student leader and we were never guaranteed this compensation.”

“I definitely would have voted for us to get the \$500 back,” said Corrado DeVincenzo, 22, Junior Class President from Bayonne. The money would have helped him with his college expenses.

DeVincenzo, a voting council member, was removed from the meeting.

“Nobody can talk about the India trip as we can,” said DeVincenzo.

DeVincenzo said he understood why the executive board may have conflict of interest concerns but once he was informed that it was a violation of the Robert's rules of order he considered the vote unfair.

“Well I feel like half the people on council were missing, so we didn't get a full perspective,” said Frank Fernandez, 29, environmental science major from Jersey City.

Fernandez voted for the motion.

“No, it wasn't fair they didn't have a say in the discussion but it also wouldn't have been fair if they had a vote,” said Emanuel Alvarez, 28, sociology major from Union City who voted against the motion.

Alvarez considered the conflict of interest concerns legitimate.

Asked if the council could vote on the motion again Moran said, “No. There is a motion to rescind, but it has to be during the same meeting and it has to be done by the winning side.”

According to Moran the council cannot reintroduce the same motion, however, they may introduce a similar, but new motion.

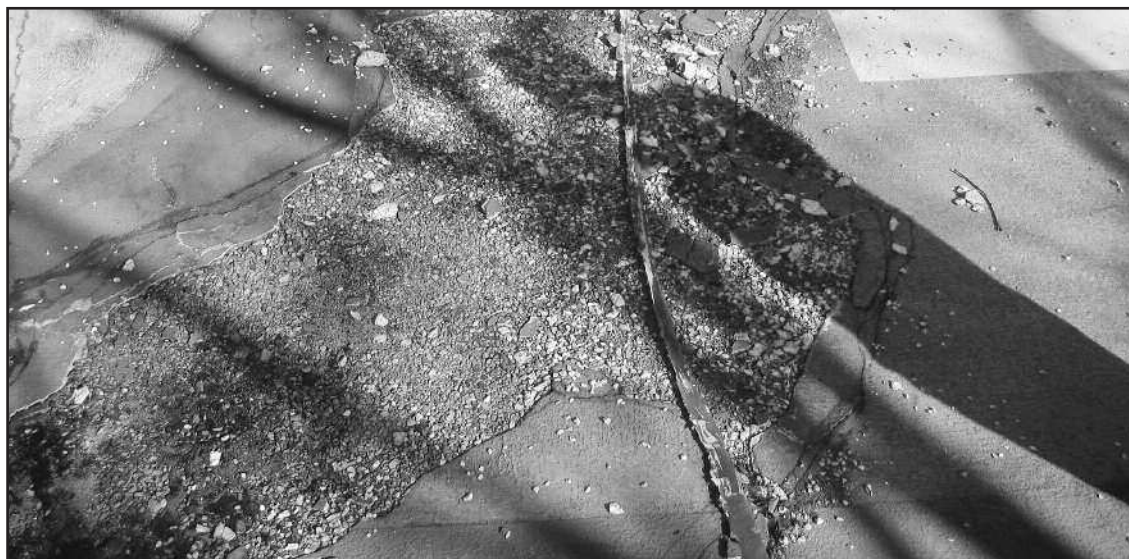

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Hall Dorm and the Facilities Building at 251 West Side Ave.

“I'm all for it, but if it increases our tuition: no,” said Joel Zaro, 22, media arts major from Jersey City. “Honestly, I like our school the way it is.” He said, “They should use some of the money for student benefit equipment.”

Andrew Christ noted that one of the chief goals was to renew HVAC equipment as well as water and electrical infrastructure to make the entire campus operate more efficiently, not only to bring down costs, but also, to make NJCU “greener.”

Anticipating student morale, the project has allocated the largest percentage to GSUB with a total sum of \$9 million. The GSUB reconstruction consists of roof replacement, deck and plaza restoration, and parking garage restoration.

According to Christ, the bulk of the construction is planned to take place this summer. The Capital Renewal Program is forecasted to be completed by the fall semester of 2013 and has met all deadlines thus far.

Andrea Escobar, 19, a education and math major from Bayonne said, “It's a great idea but we need more space. [The campus] should be expanded with more recre-

Model UN club struggles with finances

Model UN club continues with the struggle for attending conferences every year due to the financial setback they are experiencing.

“Only the people that can afford to pay for themselves will be able to go,” said Brian Flores ,21, Treasurer of the Model UN club.

The conference that the Model UN club desires to attend will be held in the United Nations Headquarters in New York City on April 1-5.

The club had submitted a request to the Student Government Organization (SGO) two weeks in advanced, in addition to having Professor Stanton writing a letter of recommendation for co-sponsorship. However, the SGO Executive Board did not approve in assisting the Model UN club with funds for the conference.

“The SGO said that they needed more specific information about how the money is going to be spent. Other schools

are able to go to conferences because their schools support them financially,” said Edwin Quito, 24, President of Model UN club.

Even before the conference at the United Nations came to interest, the conference at Harvard in February was denied for the club as well because the Executive Board believed it was too expensive.

Quito says, “We only had \$625 in our budget, so it was impossible to bring students to that conference.”

The organization consists of 10 members. The costs consist of a \$125 registration fee per student and \$250 a night for a hotel room. The conference is four days long. The Model UN club was only going to send two members of its organization to the conference.

“The selection process was not open and that’s a lot of money for two people,” said Jan Aguilos ,24, SGO Vice President of Public Information.

Even though the Model UN group experiences certain financial issues, it is very beneficial to its members.

“We try to do a lot of activities, which we do with our own funds. For instance, we took some of our members to the United Nations headquarters so they can actually see the inside,” said Flores.

“Last semester, we attended one meeting with the ambassador of the United States and we got a chance to talk to him about the issues in the Middle East. It was a really cool experience,” said Quito.

Public Safety Department keeping an eye on campus

Is NJCU as safe as we think? NJCU is located in one of the most urban and densely populated cities. Cityrating.com statistic summary reports for 2012 show that Jersey City is expecting a rise in robbery, larceny and theft.

The main concern is what has NJCU’s Public Safety Department done in the past, present and in the future to secure the safety of the students and staff?

“We always feel that public safety can do better, we always raise the bar to enter more technology to increase the number of cameras, card access, lighting around campus and our Knight Rider program,” says Bruce D. Harman, Director of Public Safety at NJCU.

There are over 100 cameras on

campus to secure students’ safety. Harman suggests that more workshops on crime prevention and streets smarts would be very useful. Harman also said that for the last ten years crimes at the NJCU campus have remained flat and consistently low over the years.

Some students may not feel as though enough is being done, such as Suzana Nereu, a NJCU student who experienced a man trying to steal a girl’s bag and says, “I think the campus is too open and anyone can just walk around and do whatever they want. There isn’t enough security walking or driving around. We definitely need more people around campus and randomly checking IDs.”

Luckily the NJCU Public Safety Department has not faced a significant reduction in staff, but one issue that the department has faced is the budget. Low budgets may mean less vigilance and not enough security on campus.

“I feel safe around campus because I park close to the building that my classes are in. I don’t really have time to explore campus, I only attend school two nights a week, but I never see public safety walking around campus or patrolling the parking garage. I think public safety

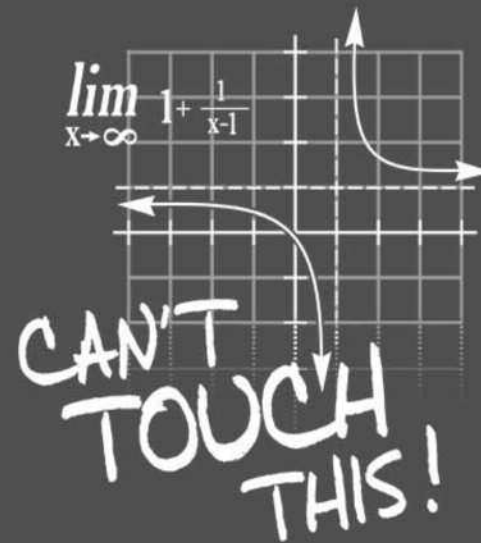

could make themselves more visible so students feel a bit safer,” says Dana Smith, 30, English major from Jersey City.

Perhaps more advertisements such as flyer distributions letting student know all 12 + NJCU Emergency contact numbers can help students feel safer. Fortunately, Public Safety Security is on campus 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, but taking the initiative to advertise the resources that NJCU provides such as: The Silent Witness Program, which allows students and staff to submit any criminal activity anonymously, Guides and Tips to provide students with what to do and what not to do, The Knight Rider Survey which transports students to another campus if needed, Campus Escort Services, Vehicle Jumpstart Services and Gothic Alerts, which notify students and staff of any criminal activity that has occurred, may continue to reduce the most common crimes around NJCU campus.

BOOST your resume with an internship

On the east side of Manhattan, around 45th St. and 1st avenue is the headquarters of the United Nations. Such prolific figures as Mandela, Castro, Kissinger, Clinton, among many others, have met at the UN to discuss global affairs.

Twice a week Edwin Quito, 24, political science major from West New York, walks in awe through the same entrance as the leaders that have shaped the world since World War II.

"It's amazing, it's unbelievable to be in the UN," said Quito.

Since January 17, Quito has been attending economic and social council meetings as an intern of the Permanent Mission of the Dominican Republic. Quito's responsibilities include researching topics to be discussed during the conference, preparing reports, and translating documents for the Dominican mission.

"I meet a lot of ambassadors and officials from many countries," said Quito, who has rubbed elbows with the Vice Secretary of the UN, ambassadors from Ecuador and Sri Lanka.

Christian Diaz, 22, international business major from Union City, is interning this spring at Atrinsic an internet marketing company.

"I did five projects at once. I couldn't even eat but it's really interesting. I like the environment," remarked Diaz about his internship. Atrinsic has offered

Diaz a job after his internship ends.

"Honestly, I would like to experience what other companies are about and what they can offer my career," said Diaz.

NJCU's proximity to New York City gives students the opportunity to intern for international corporations, various organizations, and local small businesses. NBC, Sirius Radio, Madison Square Garden, Google, the Center for Bio Defense, FBI, and the CIA are only a few of the many places where students can seek an internship.

If you're eager to find an internship related to your career goals here's a basic breakdown that can serve you as a guide.

First you have to meet certain requirements. Your GPA must be at 2.5 or higher, you need to complete at least 45 credits, and you have to officially declare your major.

Next, visit the office of Career Planning and Placement in Vodra Hall room 101. Take the time to ask the secretary any questions you may have and schedule an appointment with a cooperative education assistant director. Your major will dictate which assistant will be advising you through your internship process.

Have a sample resume ready for your first meeting. Your assistant will help you revise your resume and will also tell you about other resources such as interview coaching that will help you get

the internship you want.

Think about what internships you are interested in pursuing. Do some research on various companies and feel free to discuss what you find with your assistant.

Keep in mind that some internships have early deadlines and others have extensive back round checks that can take months.

"Everyone should come in the semester before. The reason why is because a lot of these places have deadlines to apply. If somebody wants to do something for fall 2012 they should come in now and see us," said Christopher Cofone, an assistant director at the Office of Career Planning and Placement. Cofone advises political science, business, history, and psychology majors.

Dean Brianik, assistant director who advise students majoring in national security, criminal justice, and fire science, advises students to come in freshmen and sophomore year. Back round checks in security sensitive fields can take months. The earlier you see an assistant the faster you can get a file started and look for an internship.

After your meeting with an assistant you'll be provided with a Place Pro account. Place Pro is an online service that helps you shop around for internship opportunities. You'll be able to post your resume and file internship applications for positions of your choosing.

Besides Place Pro, you can also apply to companies directly. Take a look at the classified section in the newspaper and browse through Craig's List, you might find some surprising opportuni-

ties.

Be persistent and stay positive. Eventually you'll get a call from a human resource representative and land your first interview. Schedule a visit at the barbershop or beauty salon and make sure you look fresh for your interview. Relax, with all the resources on campus preparing you for this moment you shouldn't have a problem getting the position you seek.

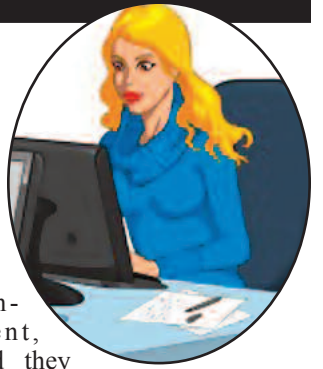
Internship hours are flexible and vary depending on your employer. Typical internships can range from 8 to 24 hours a week. If your lucky, you may find a paying internship. Also, keep in mind that you may only take up to 12 internship credits.

Students that work and attend school can still intern.

"If they [students] could commit to one day a week they can still work at their jobs," said Pamela Taylor, assistant director advising chemistry, physics, and math majors.

Once your foot is in the door don't drop the ball. An internship can do wonders for your career. It will spice up your resume and help you stand out from among the many students that make the poor decision to forgo an internship. In a highly competitive job market, an internship is a great way to boost your skills and network with employers that can offer you a job.

"If there is a problem people are going to have it's either they don't have any campus activities like the newspaper, student gov-



ernment, and they don't have an internship. So their resume is lacking," said Cofone.

Taylor stressed the positive influence internships have on developing a successful career. Taylor also said that internships make students applying for grad schools more competitive during the application process.

"We have more internships available than students," said Juan E. Arroyo, assistant director advising art, English, media, foreign language, and theater majors.

Understanding the expectations an employer may have will help students avoid rookie mistakes once they land a job. Showing creativity once you begin your internship is always a bonus.

"If you bring a set of skills you can network in that company," said Arroyo.

"Don't limit yourself," remarked Quito, "Just go for it, there are many opportunities."

Defeating Boundaries, Defying Conspiracies

Dr. Ansley LaMar, Chairman of the Psychology department, doesn't seem the conspiracy theorist type. He never was. But, with the seats in the Gothic Lounge filling up quicker than the lingering smell of barbecue, Dr. LaMar warned the standing-room only crowd of the conspiracy against our minds.

The lecture, "The Conspiracy Against Black Minds," was held to commemorate the ending of Black History Month with Dr. LaMar inspiring students to stop settling for mediocrity, stop taking easy professors, and to defy the conspiracies that have been stacked against their minds. Dr. LaMar also challenged administrators to raise the standards they have set for their students.

When Dr. LaMar's was in the fourth grade, his teacher Mrs. Stein walked into his class one day and asked her students "If you think you're stupid, please stand up." After repeating the question three times, Dr. Lamar's friend Johnny stood up. "You think you're stupid?" asked Mrs Stein. "No" replied Johnny, "But I don't want you to be the only one standing."

Through this funny, but heart-warming, anecdote, Dr. LaMar went over the industrialist oppression of the black mind. Long after the Civil War, blacks were still being discriminated against

and arrested just because they wanted new jobs. The debt and fines were too large for them to pay, forcing them to work off their debt in labor.

"We know in 1919 George Ferguson had scientific proof that black people could only do manual labor. But you know what? Black people still studied the arts, humanities, sciences, and mathematics anyway!" exclaimed Dr. LaMar. "Black people still insisted going on to college."

The barriers against blacks going to school eventually came down, but Johnny's father insisted that now there was a more dangerous conspiracy. Johnny's father told him "Now that the barriers are gone, I wonder what they're going to teach you. I wonder whether they will maintain high education standards."

The fear was that now there was a conspiracy to lower standards. As the standards were becoming lowered and lowered, Dr. LaMar wondered about how all the students who were so disadvantaged still succeeded. The Vietnamese student who didn't speak English,

or the student who, despite being arrested for prostitution, still went to college and thrived.

"Our students don't work if they don't have to. I also know that if we raise our standards, our students meet that standard," said Dr. LaMar.

"We've lowered our standard to the point where students feel entitled. They don't choose to study to get a good grade," said Dr. LaMar, "I'm stunned students believe they can work full time, go to school full time, have a full social life, and still get good grades! Someone taught them that it was okay to negotiate with professors in order to get good grades."

But, what can students do to defy these conspiracies?

Dr. Lamar had many words of advice. "Go to class everyday and be an active participant and

be an active participant because you have read the material. You should also visit your professors during their office hours, how many students do that? Visit your professor and ask him what their expectations are, then exceed them."

More importantly, however, students need to stop "chasing A's."

"If you chase the A, it will run away," said Dr. LaMar, "But if you write a vision statement for yourself on where you see yourself in five years, at the beginning of every semester, you can go back and review those essays at the end of the semester."

In closing, Dr. Lamar challenged the administration and university to help students.

"I think every student who comes to NJCU should go to the OSP program or TLC program and if we cannot supply those services to all of our students, we need to stop recruiting students that we can't accommodate."

The burden isn't just on students alone, but Dr. LaMar says he envisions the faculty members to come together and talk about the shared vision of the university.

"I would love for us to develop a trust relationship where we could just show up to each others classes, unannounced, and give each other feedback on our teaching style, content, and etc..."

Dr. LaMar also expressed concern over professors who don't

challenge students.

"I think all our students need to be challenged, adamantly," said Dr. LaMar, "I think as faculty members we need to come together and correct each other, I think education is about being challenged."

Dr. LaMar feels that there also needs to be an across-the-board increase in standards for students. When standards are increased, however, it means the professors have to help students meet them.

"Classes with three credit classes have to be for four hours, three hours for content and one hour on how to figure out and engage that content," said Dr. LaMar.

He also feels that professors have to "adopt" five students a semester and coach them for a semester. For one hour a week professors would teach students how to negotiate the system.

"If all of the 300 full-time faculty did that, we'd help 1,500 students a semester. 1,500 students who now know how to negotiate the system, know how to study, know how to improve, and know that there is somebody holding them accountable," said Dr. Lamar.

Dr. LaMar feels that ultimately the responsibility falls on students.

"Administration can open the locks. Faculty can open the door. But you, my dear students, have to step through it."

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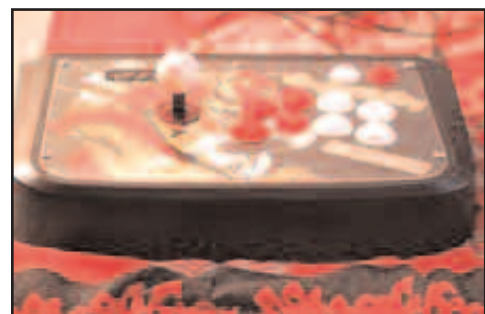

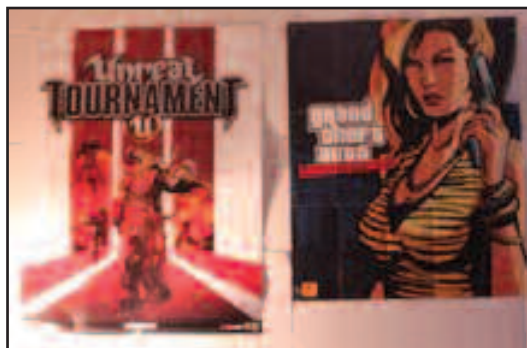


Mei Ling Wu's bed in the deomroom she shares with one other student.

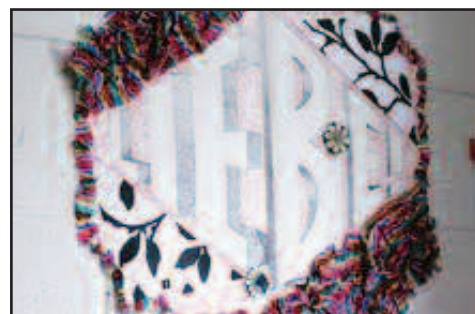
Mei Ling is an individual, who gives off positive energy and says, "I like being around people, most importantly helping them. I've learned that sometimes going out of

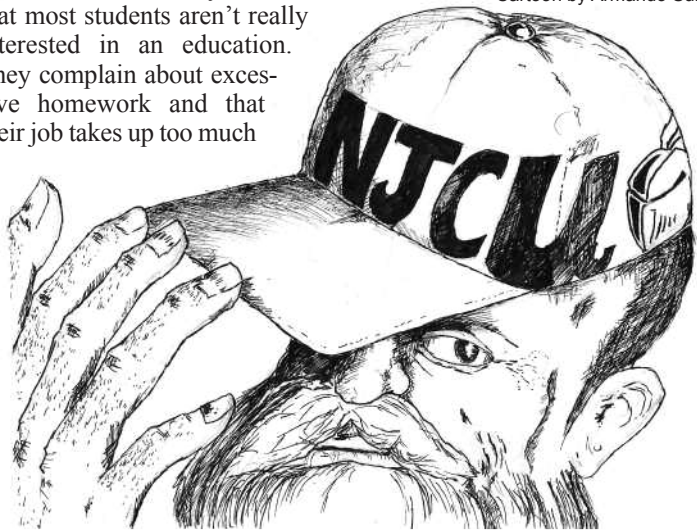

NJCU athletes pursue the Pro draft

NJCU's very own Senior basketball players, Keith Williams, 22, Business Administration, from Jersey City, NJ and Taquan Abdullah, 22, Accounting, from Kenilworth, NJ, will be pursuing the Pro Draft after graduation.

Both players were the team captains and will be heading to a camp in New Hampshire to display their talents to various scouts. When asked about whether they like to play in either the Euro League or the NBA, both said the Euro League.

"The Euro League is real. We can develop more of our game playing overseas," said Abdullah, who has played all four years here at NJCU.

Williams is a transfer and only played two years here at NJCU. Head Coach Marc Brown ranked Williams and Abdullah out of all the players he's coached.

"Top 10 [easily]," said Coach Brown. "They have contributed a lot these past years."

The contribution has been stellar. Since these two players have played together, they have contributed a 36-17 record with a NJAC title. This past season, Williams averaged 10.3 Pts/G, 4.0 Ast/G and 2.5 Stl/G while Abdullah averaged 6.0 Pts/G, 3.4 Reb/G, and 0.6 Stl/G.

The Gothic Knights went 17-7 this past season and failed to earn a NJAC Tournament bid in their final regular season home game. Despite that, they had an astounding home record of 10-2.

Playing Division III basketball arguably hinders a player's chances of going pro. Don't tell that to Williams and Abdullah.

"Division III basketball does not hurt us. Division I doesn't worry about their players' overall game, the intangibles, and the little things that help you become solid players," said Williams. "I think we can take on some Division I teams. [We can take on] St. Peter's."

Coach Brown shared his thoughts on his players applying for the Pro Draft and their oppor-

tunity to play either in the NBA or overseas.

"In the NBA, no. But if you put them in the right team, country, and style, then maybe they can succeed," said Coach Brown.

NJCU Athlete Profile: Bez Arslani

Off comes the shiny black bracelet Bez Arslani always wears. He puts it in the right shoe he has just taken off, a shoe that will be replaced by a neon green volleyball sneaker. The shoe carrying his bracelet and its lefty counterpart always goes into his bag, toes facing the court.

"Well, I can't wear the bracelet during a volleyball game." He shrugs. "Putting it in my shoe is some type of superstitious thing I think, but it helps me."

It certainly does. In four weeks Arslani has captured Skyline Conference Rookie of the Week 3 times; the one week he didn't, he made the conference Honor Roll.

The 19-year-old freshman outside hitter from Wayne, New Jersey only just began his career as a Gothic Knight men's volleyball player. However, Arslani's impact has been tremendous, bracelet or no bracelet.

"I found the bracelet in my brother's room. My brother is my hero. I look up to him because of what and how he does things in his life. This bracelet helps me play volleyball. No matter how far away, my brother's always with me. I hear him in my head when I'm playing," said Arslani.

Family fuels Arslani's drive. "My number one fan is my sister. She comes to all my games no matter how far they are." He adds, "My family is everything to me. Without their support I wouldn't be where I am today."

The health science major attends NJCU because it's close to home. Yet, a second home is being forged on the volleyball court.

"Our team is like a big family. Say we lose a point. No one gets mad at each other. It's unlike last year. In high school it was 'all about Bez.' I wanted to have fun—that was what I was looking for. Not for everything to be about me," he said.

Considering the offensive threat that he poses, Arslani's favorite aspect of the game might surprise some.

"My favorite thing about playing is getting a dig [passing the ball after the opposing team attacks it]. You get so hyped up and bring the other player's momentum down," said Arslani.

His passion proves to be a great part of the team's successes. Much like his brother has helped him to be his best, Arslani motivates his teammates to do better.

"Besides his great talent, Bez brings fire, heart and a winning attitude to the team. His leadership is unlike any freshman that has come in to the program since I came here in 2005," said head coach Kevin Rodgers. "On the court he contributes in every aspect of the game. He leads our team in service aces, kills, digs, and has

one of the highest passing percentages on the team. Off the court, he has one of the highest GPAs. The great thing about Bez is he wants to be even better. He knows he can be an elite student-athlete and he's doing everything necessary to be one."

Arslani so far has contributed 237 kills with a .247 hitting percentage, 102 digs, 23 blocks and 27 service aces for 59 games, 17 matches. The Gothic Knights make their way through the season at 8-9 overall, 5-4 in the Skyline Conference. They have 13 matches left until the regular-season ends. The team is optimistic, especially with such effort from one of the starting players.

"You can just tell how much Bez loves and cares about the game by the way he pushes for every point. If he does something wrong, he'll immediately ask one of the captains or the coaches what he needs to do to fix it," said senior co-captain Kenny Lisk, a 21 year-old chemistry and secondary education major from Old Bridge. "He's already done so much this year, but there's no sign of slowing down. He's going to have a very special career and will be a great leader for this program."

With the superstitious luck of his bracelet and his family, on the court and off, pushing him towards his goals, Arslani may accomplish more than conference accolades and post-season victories. He hopes that after his collegiate career he can play on a professional volleyball team in Europe. After that, he believes teaching physical education and coaching are his calling.

The arrival of Jeremy Lin has captivated the basketball universe and has created a media uproar that the NBA has not seen in years. The 6'3," 200 lbs., Asian point guard, has taken over headlines across the U.S and has brought the New York Knickerbockers a surge of momentum. The Knicks were 8-15 and had lost 11 of 13 when head coach, Mike D'Antoni, out of desperation, he subbed Jeremy Lin into the lineup in a Feb. 4th game against Hudson River rival New Jersey Nets. At the time, there was speculation that D'Antoni's job was at risk. In this game, Lin outplayed Nets' All-Star PG Deron Williams and had career highs with 25 points, 5 rebounds, and 7 assists.

After only 12 games he was selected to the Rising Stars game for the All-Star weekend. Lin has led the Knicks to a 9-3 record since joining the rotation. In his first twelve starts Lin has averaged 22.5 points and 8.7 assists. Lin came from the depths of last on the bench to a franchise saving PG. Lin has managed to break the NBA record for the most points and assists in those first twelve starts.

A PG is a facilitator, floor general, and tempo setter. Lin possesses all these qualities along with his devastating cross over and stutter step. His explosiveness sets up penetration lanes and this has set up opportunities for his other teammates. When asked what was the biggest win of their season, Parisi replied, "Sacred Hart University and University of Maryland Eastern Shore." They played the number 2 and 6th ranked seeds, in which they came back to pull off a victory after trailing 0-3 against Sacred Heart, finishing 4-3; and after that, they were on a roll, defeating University of Maryland of Eastern Shore 4-1.

As for some of the players who

stood out this season, "were a pretty balanced team," said Parisi.

Sonja Shirak, 18, Early Childhood Education, from Clifton, NJ had her best individual career

effort, posting a 191 average and 955 pinfall in five games (188-203-211-186-167) to finish 13th among 126 bowlers. At the Morgan State University James Brown Invitational, she earned Second Team All Tournament Team honors, placing 6th overall of 134 competitors after posting a remarkable 216 average on day two of the competition with 1083 total pinfall.

Shirak stated that her biggest win of the season was when she

took first place at the Dover, Delaware tournament. "I was honestly on cloud nine, I knew I had potential to keep up with the girls at these tournaments that we were put in, but when they called my name for first place I was shocked."

Speaking fondly of her teammates and coaches, "I can honestly say, I have the best coaches in the world; they have this incredible quality to them, that when I am down or they see that

I need to talk, they are there within a heartbeat. They see what others can not and sometimes know what is best for me or the team before we or I realize it."

With the great news surrounding assistant coach Thomsen this past weekend, the girls are definitely going to want to put their best foot forward for the remainder of the season. Thomsen has advanced past the qualifying stage of the 2012 U.S. Open, following Friday mornings Cashers Qualifying Round at the 69th U.S. Open, being held this week at Brunswick Zone Caroliers Lanes.

In his 10th year as NJCU's assistant coach, he is the only player from the state of New Jersey to reach the round of 24. During the next stage of the tournament, he will bowl each of the final 23 kglers in the field.

As for the rest of the season, they are outside eight teams looking in. They may have had a bit of a shaky road for some of the past couple weeks, but as Coach Parisi said, "that is all in the past now, we have to focus on what is ahead." He then goes on to speak of his Thomsen, "he is also a very big part of why this program is what it is today and continues to be, along with his expertise that he instills in our team."

Shirak sees a bright future for the Gothic Knights as well, "our teamwork and dedication will get us extremely far, we click real well and understand what we all are going through; they are there for me constantly and I will definitely be there when they need me, I couldn't have asked for a better group of girls." She adds, "With our heart/drive and our coaches' support, I see nothing but good things to happen in the rest of the season."
